Population Growth means

- Increasing workforce
- Adding equipment
- Upgrading infrastructure
- Investing in city assets

#### **Police**

#### Successes

- Crime rate dropped more than 15%from previous year
- Clearance rate increased to 72%
- Implemented bodyworn cameras

- High turnover
- Annexation will require additional staff
- Continued High incidence of alcohol and drug related crime

#### Fire

#### Successes

- Purchased a new ladder truck
- Added 4th Fire Hall
- Reduced ISO risk rating from a 4 to 3

- Add a full time Fire Marshall
- Increase full time firefighters

#### Parks and Recreation

#### Successes

- Created and filled new Parks Superintendent Position
- Completed an outdoor classroom and pavilion at North Country Park
- Rec Desk online reservation system

- Increased staffing needs for new and recently renovated parks
- Ice Study review and recommendations for Neilson Riese Arena

#### **Streets**

#### Successes

- \$1.7 million street renewal project completed in 2018
- Installation of decorative thermal plastic crosswalks to make TH 197
- Swept 1809 miles of streets and disposed of 516 cubic yards of debris.

- Fix and repave existing paved alleys
- Upgrade Elliot Road to pavement (shared with Northern Township)
- Annexation will require an additional street department employee and motor grader

#### Public Works – Water

PFCs identified in well water

Currently 5 of 7 wells shut down

Blending water in two remaining wells New well to be completed in 2019

Water treatment need is still unknown

#### Waste Water Treatment

#### Operation and maintenance of WWTF

Inflow – 380 million gallons/year Land applied sludge – 1.3million gallons/year

\$500,000 maintenance project on aeration system

#### Waste Water Treatment

**Capacity Analysis** 

Study considered 22 unsewered areas in and around the city

Showed 3070 additional REUs (residential equivalency units) System
Capacity/Clarifier
Redundancy

No redundancy when one is shut down for maintenance

We can meet our permit with current equipment, but additional flows will be difficult to manage

Nitrogen & Permitting

MPCA may establish an ammonia-nitrogen effluent limit for the city in our new permit

Until we know if we have to treat for ammonia-nitrogen, we won't build a new clarifier

#### Successes

- Retained the Municipal Delegation Agreement with the State
- Inspectors received I-pad devices for field use
- Annual contractor/building department roundtable in March

- Increased rental inspections and need for additional staff with annexation
- Develop digital processes for electronic plan review, permitting & inspections
- New codes will require training

Joint Planning Board Budget – City: \$157,500; Township: \$50,550

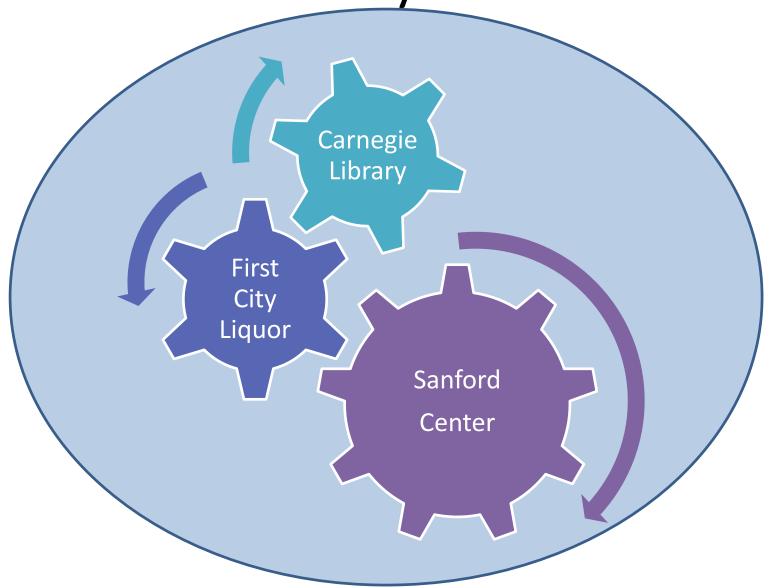
# Planning

#### Successes

- Completed the Zoning and Subdivision
   Ordinance update
- Completed a draft
   Comprehensive Plan
- Working to update and extend our Joint Powers Agreement

- Department is short one code enforcement staff
- Pace of development continues to strain staff resources
- Few development areas in the city for single family housing

# Liquor Store

Two Bemidji stores generate \$645,000 for city coffers

New store construction bonds are paid by liquor profits

After bond payment, profits add \$461,000 to general fund annually

Profits fund projects:
Vet's home,
Carnegie,
Parks, etc.

# Carnegie Library

Volunteers raised \$2.2 million

Including two Legacy Grants from Minnesota Historical Society - \$50k and \$350K

City contributing \$200K for construction shortfall from liquor store profits

Letters of Intent from two tenants

Expected to be completed in May

\$450,000 annual subsidy paid by city property owners

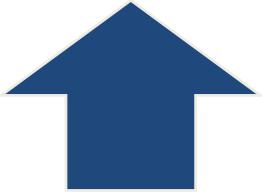
\$750,000 annual capital improvement needs (currently funding \$230,000 annually)
